From the District Administrator's Desk

Dear Readers.

This year marks the 26th year as a District Administrator handing out diplomas at graduation. Add in the years as an assistant district administrator, years as a principal and before that a teacher, puts this well over the 40 year mark helping honor our high school graduates. What made this year the most exceptional was the twenty two Tigerton graduates. No two were alike and they all are very unique and special!

The students in Tigerton are blessed to have a quality education and very good community supporting that education. Recently we did an exercise with the School Board to identify why we have an outstanding school system. In addition to academic excellence the Board identified that our students have great extracurricular programs, very good student teacher ratio, a personalized education, three year old kindergarten program, full child care, Fitness Center, Driver Education Program (most schools have dropped this), school forest and much more.

Another blessing is our summer school program. More than half of the students in the District attend summer school. This is critical for student learning as all the research on the topic shows a significant amount of learning loss for those children who don't have summer learning opportunities including a great deal of reading.

For those not attending summer school and/or doing a significant amount of summer reading, the loss is generally in the area of three months which adds up to over two years of lost learning by middle school age. This accumulated two-year gap simply puts students' way behind in school with risk of not graduating or being college or career ready.

Our Challenge

For fear of starting to sound like a broken record, almost all of our rural schools in Wisconsin including Tigerton are struggling under our state's school finance system. While the necessary reductions in spending have been made we are going to have to look at finding additional revenue within the next 2 to 3 years. We need to start having more conversations about the "R" word (referendum). Sometime between January 2016 and January 2017 this will become a necessity.

Fortunately, our State Legislature is starting to recognize this issue and we remain somewhat optimistic some help will be forthcoming to minimize the need for going to the local taxpayers for help. The recently completed Assembly

From the Principal's Desk

The spring brought a flurry of activity at the Tigerton School District. Students performed their concerts, took their spring MAP test, traveled the state on field trips, participated in field day, took final exams, cleaned out their desks and lockers, and prepared for next school year. Additionally, we held the 105th Tigerton High School graduation. The seniors eagerly anticipate this event, as it signals the end of this chapter of their lives. We wish them good luck in whatever path they take next, and I would like to thank them for all of the positive contributions they have made to the Tigerton School District.

Summer is vacation time for students, and it is the perfect time for teachers and the district to be involved with programs and updates that help improve our educational program. Staff members will take time to learn about the new Teacher Effectiveness Evaluation plan that has been developed by the State of Wisconsin. This plan will be fully implemented this upcoming school year. Last summer staff members worked on updating the math and reading curriculum in order to fully implement the Common Core Standards in these areas, and this summer staff members will work on updating the science curriculum. During the summer, the district will continue to upgrade the technology that is used by staff and students. We will upgrade the computer network at the elementary by updating some major network components, and we will also upgrade all of the school owned computers to an updated operating system.

The 2014-15 school year will be the first year of the new Smarter Balanced Assessment, which will be taken by students in grades three through eight, and which will replace a major portion of the WKCE tests. Additionally, high school students in grades nine and ten will take a version of the ACT test, and all students in eleventh grade will take the ACT test. This new testing will take place in the spring, and as the year progresses, we will update parents on the schedules and expectations for these tests.

I look forward to the 2014-15 school year and all of the excitement, education, and experiences that await us. Have a great summer.

School Lunch Program Update and Reminder for the 2014-2015 School Year

We just recently had the pleasure of giving Mrs. Kakes 5th grade class a tour of the lunch room in anticipation of their arrival next year. There will be noticeable changes for these students, not only in location, but also in the requirements of the food program.



- Salad bar will be available to them daily!
- 2. Seconds are available at the salad bar only.
- 3. Alternate is still available, but consists of yogurt, string cheese or a combination of both.

A new change for all students in the upcoming school year is the breakfast fruit requirement. As a school, we are required to offer at least one cup of fruit per student. The students are required to take at least one half cup of what is offered. It can be fruit or fruit juice. Fruit juice can only be half of the one cup serving.

A guick reminder for the lunch program requirements:

The school is required to offer each student five components at their meal. They consist of one grain, one protein, one vegetable, one fruit and one dairy. The student is only required to take three of the five components. One of which has to be one half cup of fruit and/or vegetable. We still see students taking all that is offered, because they think they have to, and throwing the majority of the food away. In an effort to cut down on the schools food waste and cost, we encourage you to speak with your children about the school food program and its requirements. As a kitchen staff, we will continue day to day education and enlist those additional staff members to help through the appropriate classes.

The kitchen staff would like to take a minute to thank the students for their patience during this lunch program transition. As we continue to learn the nuances of what DPI requires, we will pass them along to all students, staff, and parents. We also want to thank the students that took the time to complete our lunch survey that we did this past winter. We have compiled all the results and will be making some of the changes that they have requested.

3-Year-Old Kindergarten 2014-2015

The Tigerton School District will again be offering a 3-Year Old Kindergarten program during the 2014-2015 school year. Students will learn communication & language development, pre-writing, social & emotional development, physical skills, cognitive development, math & science skills and character education.

Children must be 3 years of age by September 1, 2014 and potty trained to enroll. The 3-Year Old Kindergarten program is open to both resident and non-resident children. Classes will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8:00 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. at the Tigerton Elementary School. Busing to and from school will be available for children residing in the Tigerton School District. Enrollment fees for the program are \$40 per month per child. Enrollment is limited and available on a first come first serve basis. (There are currently 6 seats remaining for the 2014-15 school year.)

Navarino Nature Center

The kindergarten class also went on a field trip to Navarino Nature Center. While there, they participated in a pond study and a forest floor study. As part of the forest floor study, the students were divided into groups and were given the task to find living things to collect. After the collection, the class got together to talk about the things they found. For the pond study, the students were able to put on rubber boots and walk into the pond. Using nets, they collected pond life and then were able to take a closer look at what they found. All of the living things the students found were returned to their habitats. The students had a great time and learned a lot!

Planting on the Prairie

With the help of a Thrivent grant, the Tigerton kindergarten class recently planted some new prairie plants at the prairie that is located behind the Tigerton High School (The prairie was originally planted many years ago as an elementary school project). Peggy Miller, who was very instrumental in the start of the prairie, met the kindergarten class at the prairie. She talked to the class about the prairie and helped them identify many of the plants. The students then helped plant the seedlings that were purchased with the money from Thrivent.

The grant also allowed us to purchase plant identification markers so that we can label some of the prairie plants. We were also able to purchase supplies to make a new sign for the prairie. This will be completed in the fall.

An Earth & Sky Expedition

The first, second and third graders of Tigerton Elementary School went on a field trip to the Weis Earth Museum and Barlow Planetarium located at the University of Wisconsin-Fox Valley in Menasha on Thursday, May 8. The students had hands-on fun with rocks and soil at the Weis Earth Museum. Students looked at dinosaur fossils including Tyrannosaurus Rex Stan, and they even made an earthquake. In the Barlow Planetarium, the students investigated why the moon changes, looked at images of the sun and planets, and learned about many of the stars and constellations in our night sky. This included traveling through the Milky Way galaxy and going into a black hole.



Mosquito Hill Nature Center Trip

Mrs. Brady's third grade class went to Mosquito Hill Nature Center on Friday, May 23. The students were led by Volunteer Naturalist Ginny for a walk through in the lowlands and prairie. She also had students play "What is That?". Naturalist Director Mike Hubbard led the students on a hike up Mosquito Hill. Students were shown the variety of natural habitats found at Mosquito Hill Nature Center, and they discussed physical characteristics that made each area unique. Students were also told how living organisms adapted to surviving in this environment and the relationships between plants and animals. Students were informed about the unique geologic formations of MHNC, and discussed how glaciers and water affects the topography of an area.

Our class also participated in the No Waste Lunch Program. Students were asked to separate recyclables and items for composting from their trash. The class enjoyed looking for snakes on their hike. The students found it very interesting that Mosquito Hill was used as a ski jump and that it contains Native American effigy mounds. They also learned how Wisconsin used to be located near the equator thousands of years ago.


Tigerton 4th graders enjoyed the outdoors this past school year. In mid February they went to the School Forest and walked in snowshoes

Students Battle It Out in the Library

Earlier this spring, students at the Elementary and Middle Schools participated in the annual Battle of the Books sponsored by the Wisconsin Educational Media & Technology Association (WEMTA) and the local school librar-

ies. Five teams from the 4th and 5th grades participated in the Elementary Level competition and for the first time, two teams battled it out at the Middle School Level. Battle of the Books was created to promote a love of reading in students. The competition encourages students to read a variety of books and remember information about the plots, characters, and settings of the books.

The format of the contest resembles a cross between a spelling bee and a high quiz meet. During the first round, each team has opportunities to answer questions pertaining to the required books. Points are awarded accordingly for getting the correct title and/or correct author. Upon completion of the first round, the two highest scoring teams advance to battle it out head-to-head in the Championship Round. Earning the 2014 Elementary Level Title was the 5th grade team of Adrienne Brady, Anthony Thiel, Kaylee Tauferner, and Ladia Block. Winning the Middle School competition was the 6th grade team of Nariah Bottelman, Bethany Kreklow, and Brooke Herres.

The local winners then competed in the State Battle. Unlike the local competition, which was held face-to-face, students competed online for the state title with the results released shortly thereafter.

With a renewed interest in reading and some strong teams participating in the Elementary and now the Middle School Divisions, it is hoped participation in Battle of the Books will continue to grow, allowing the opportunity for Tigerton Schools to field more teams in the Middle and eventually Senior High Divisions in the future. Sixth Graders Host Forces and Sports Festival

During second semester, students in Mrs. Minniecheske's sixth grade science class studied forces and motion. They applied the information they learned to a specific Olympic winter sport they were researching. For example, one student explained Newton's First Law using the sport of luge, "When the luge goes around a curve the person leans in the opposite direction because their body wants to keep going straight". Each student then designed a 3-D model of their sport and also a poster explaining how forces and Newton's Laws of Motion applied to the sport. During the Forces

and Sports Festival friends, family, staff members, and other students came to the high school library to view the projects and asked the students questions. Displays were then left in the library for the remainder of the day for others to view. This was an excellent opportunity for the sixth grader students to show how much they have learned and to practice public speaking skills.

Next they sketched their proposed design on paper, labeling the parts and the needed materials. Students then began the construction and troubleshooting phase. After some struggles and challenges all the eighth graders accomplished the task and were deemed successful flashlight engineers.



Tigerton Baseball



Band Department Wraps Up Another Successful Year



Each child should bring their own snack for milk break.

Each child should bring their own snack for milk break.


