



3-Year-Old Kindergarten 2019-2020

The School District of Tigerton will again be offering a 3-Year Old Kindergarten program during the 2019-20 school year. Students will learn communication and language development, prewriting, social and emotional development, physical skills, cognitive development, math and science skills, and character education.

Children must be three years of age by September 1, 2019, and potty trained to enroll. The 3-Year Old Kindergarten program is open to both resident and non-resident children. Currently one session is scheduled to be held Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8 until 11:30 a.m. at the Tigerton Elementary School. If there is enough interest another session may be added. Busing to and from school will be available for children residing in the School District of Tigerton. Enrollment fees for the program are \$45 per month per child. Enrollment is limited and available on a first come first served basis.

4K will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. A parent information letter will be sent home later this summer.

Tigerton Elementary School Garden

Tigerton Elementary School's garden has expanded to include a new area with three raised garden beds! Funding for this was from a grant the school received from the Whole Kids Foundation. The wood chips for under the raised beds were donated by the Tigerton Lumber Company. The kindergarten class planted tomato and pepper seeds in school and then transplanted the plants outside. They also planted assorted vegetable seeds in the garden and helped tend the garden while school was still in session. The summer school program will take over the garden, doing some additional planting and tending the garden, during the summer. Not only are the students learning a lot about plants and nutrition, but the produce from the garden will be used by the school's food service, giving the students a chance to enjoy fresh vegetables.

A big thanks goes to the Whole Kids Foundation and the Tigerton Lumber Company for their support of this project as well as to Tim Zimdars for building the garden and Amy Laatsch for writing the grant.

Farewell to Debby Griepentrog

On the night of January 16, 2019, Tigerton High School lost one of its longest working, loyal employees, Debby Griepentrog. Debby was born and raised in Tigerton, starting kindergarten in 1958, graduating in 1971, and coming to work in the school library that same year. For 47 years she was like a fixture, knowing three and four generations, seeing many students, teachers, and administrators come and go as well as equipment she worked with.

Over the years, the job she loved had many duties besides doing extras that brought her close to the people around her. She was very proud to be the school historian and organized a core of volunteers to help put out Alumni Directories and

the 2009 Centennial Anniversary booklet together.

A special meeting was called before school the next morning on January 17 in the commons to inform the students of her passing. The school flag was flown at half-staff in sad tribute to her memory. The teachers, especially middle school, encouraged the students to write down their feelings on cards. These cards were given to Debby's great niece, Isabella, and great nephew, Gabriel, in middle school. Debby's two other THS and TES great nephews, Zeke and Caleb, were shown tremendous sympathy and support. Debby touched many lives. Also that week, there was a purple and gold day in her honor, where students and staff wore the school colors, which were also Debby's favorite. A picture was taken in the gym (picture on next page), posted on the school website, and put in the Chronicle. The middle school basketball team dedicated their game to Debby that night, giving cheers for her and felt she helped them win.



The day of her burial, January 25, was sunny, but there was a wind chill of 20 below. About 100 family and friends showed up for the graveside service, including many current and former staff as well as former students and classmates. That afternoon at the school, the students gathered in the gym for a tribute to Debby. The recorded song 'Spirit in the Sky' was played, as it was her burial request. There was even a goodbye on the sign outside.



Many donated to a memorial fund set up for Debby. With that money, the family chose items to put in places that meant a lot to her. They gave toward the new sound system in the gym. In later years Debby really appreciated a place to rest while watching or waiting, so benches were locally purchased and set up at both schools (picture on left), picnic tables have been placed at the ball diamond, and a homemade bench by her cousin Joel Minniecheske now stands in the school forest. The Main Street program in Tigerton works to keep the village thriving so was also a choice for a donation. Debby loved Main Street's 4th of July fireworks, always sitting behind the school to watch them. Others from school offered to mark the place on the school bleachers where she always sat as a faithful fan; put her name on a tile in the commons; had a special page in the annual made for her; and gave her a tribute at Awards Night (picture above) and Graduation. A former student, Jenna Lilja, sketched Debby's graduation picture in purple to hang in the library, matted and framed in purple and gold, paid for by the Spirit Club of which Debby was a founder.

Last fall, Debby had drawn up the THS Family Trees for a graduation bulletin board of the 2019 graduates, listing parents and grandparents and a few with great-grandparents who graduated from THS too. This was one of Debby's ideas long ago and she did it every year. Tabby Arndt, a senior, worked many hours for nearly a month to fulfill Debby's wish for this year and it was on display for graduation. (Picture on next page.)

Most people don't realize how much Debby did for Tigerton and the school. Many things were behind the scenes and on her own time. She never wanted attention drawn to herself and didn't even like her picture taken. Her motto was 'A good name is worth more than great riches.' She was true to her word and could always be counted on. One strived to be their best around her. She will be missed, but not forgotten.



About the THS Family Tree Bulletin Board

The 2019 graduation bulletin board, designed by Debby Griepentrog, holds the pictures of 23 graduates and 39 ancestors of them who were also THS graduates. Jared Berg's family tree goes back the farthest, to his great-grandparents, Tony Berg, THS 1935, and Helen Brady, THS 1933. Others with four generations are Jaidan, Noah, Sheridan, and Tabby & Olivia (who are on the same tree). Others have two and three generations, sometimes skipping a generation, but seven are the first of a line to graduate from Tigerton and are depicted as tulips, just starting out with green shoots.

Hopefully, Debby's brain child of 'THS family trees' will continue at graduations in years to come. Families that put down good roots in Tigerton can keep our "graduation's school forest" growing.
