### From the District Administrator's Desk

Dear Readers.

Recently my friends, the Blairs, ran into some of our students and staff out on a class field trip. The Blairs are originally from Waupaca where

they worked as a high school teacher (wife) and a state probation officer (husband). When they met our students they snapped a photo which is featured to the right. On a personal note, I can still beat "all" of the students at pickle-ball!.

The point of mentioning this is the impression our friends had of our students and staff. They wrote to me with the following comments: "You can be proud of how your students acted in public. Nice kids and the teachers also seemed very nice, too!



They almost made me want to come out of retirement to go back and teach."

We simply have awesome students, a great staff, and the best place around to live and raise a family.

### Summer School

To date we have well over 100 students enrolled in summer school. We still have a few openings in some of the programs though, so there's still time to contact Brenda Gauthier for enrollment. Classes and staff for this program are set to ensure summer offerings from remedial to enrichment. STEM is again offered through our Distance Learning Network along with our partnership with the Village of Tigerton for the summer recreation program.

For those not attending summer school or doing a significant amount of summer reading, the loss is generally in the area of three months which adds up to over two years of lost learning by middle school age. This accumulated two-year gap simply puts students' way behind in school with risk of not graduating or being college or career ready.

### Summary

The Tigerton Schools are still a great place for all children to have the opportunity for a quality education. We may be small but we are mighty and offer personal services that larger schools generally lack. Every child is thus able to get the attention they need to be successful.

On another note, as all school districts in Wisconsin are suffering from reduced resources, we will continue to make it work in Tigerton and with continued community support have a very bright future.

It is an honor to serve as your part time District Administrator. Please know that your ideas and suggestions on how to make the Tigerton Schools even better are always welcome.





### Guidance Notes-

3-Year-Old Kindergarten

2015-2016

Children must be 3 years of age by September 1, 2015 and potty trained to enroll. The 3-Year Old Kindergarten program is open to both resident and non-resident children. Classes will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8:00 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. at the Tigerton Elementary School. Busing to and from school will be available for children residing in the Tigerton School District. Enrollment fees for the program are \$40 per month per child. Enrollment is limited and available on a first come first serve basis.

# BATTLE OK 5

Students from our Elementary, Middle, and High Schools participated in the annual Battle of the Books sponsored by the Wisconsin Educational Media & Technology Association (WEMTA) and the local school libraries. Four teams from 4th and 5th grades participated locally in the Elementary Level competition, while two teams battled it out at the Middle School Level. After bringing the battle back in the Middle School last year, Tigerton was able to field a team to compete at the High School level for the first time this season. Battle of the Books was created to promote a love of reading in students. Since last fall, the competitors have been reading a variety of books and working to remember information about the plots, characters, and settings of the books.



The format of the contest resembles a cross between a spelling bee and a high quiz meet. During the first round, each team has opportunities to answer questions pertaining to the required books. Points are awarded accordingly for getting the correct title and/or correct author. Upon completion of the first round, the two highest scoring teams advance to battle it out head-to-head in the Championship Round.

The local winners then competed in the State Battle against teams from around Wisconsin, many from schools much larger than our own. Unlike the local competition, which was held face-to-face, students competed online for the state title with the results released shortly thereafter.

Earning the local Elementary Level Title and placing 52nd out of over 150 teams in Wisconsin was the 5th grade team of Mary Kreklow, Jocelyn Menge, Elizabeth Robbins and Bethany Jobe. Winning the local Middle School



competition and finishing in a tie for 31st out of 156 teams was Kaylee Tauferner, Colleen Smith, Bethany Kreklow, and Adrienne Brady. Placing 38th out of 90 schools competing at the High School Level was the team of Leah Jobe, Hannah DenOtter, and Serena Smith. Not bad for teams who are relatively inexperienced with the state competition!

With a renewed interest in reading and students becoming increasingly familiar with the Battle of the Books competition, it is hoped participation in Battle of the Books will continue to grow at all three levels in our buildings in the future. ### **Fang Visits the Elementary**

Since early February, our Elementary students have been busy getting books from the library to participate in Fang's Reading Club. This activity is sponsored by the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers, the Class A affiliate of the Milwaukee Brewers. On April 1st, Fang T. Rattler, the teams mascot, made a visit to the school to meet the students, check on their progress, share a story, and sign a few autographs.

Fang's Reading Club consists of four 2-week segments which correspond to the bases on a baseball diamond. To reach a base during each segment, students must meet a reading goal which has been set up for

them by their classroom teachers. When they reach a base, they are awarded an incentive prize from the Rattlers. When students reach all four bases, resulting in a home run, they are rewarded with a free ticket for the Tigerton Family Night game vs. Kane County on May 15 and a voucher for a hotdog and soda at Fox Cities Stadium.

To keep track of their progress, each participant colors their own baseball field on a sheet of paper, and they are displayed throughout the hallways in the Elementary School. Students are then allowed to place a "Fang" on each base when it is earned.

The Tigerton Elementary School has participated in Fang's Reading Club for a number of years, not only for the opportunity to have a fun night out at the ballpark, but also to help students develop a fondness for reading and to improve their library and literacy skills.











The kindergarten class recently held a Family
Day. For this event, the students' families were invit-

ed to come to school for an afternoon. While the families were at school, they watched a DVD showing highlights of the school year. After that, the students performed a Readers' Theater for their guests. Each student was then given a bag containing supplies and directions needed to make some math and reading games that can be played over the summer. The families spent some time making the games and learning to play them. The afternoon ended with ice cream sundaes for all.



### Kindergarten in the Community

The kindergarten class has been learning about our community. Throughout the year, the class has visited some of the local businesses (the ones within walking distance from the school). The purpose of these trips is to expose the students to the kinds of businesses in our village as well as to learn about community helpers. Recently, the class visited the Tigerton Post Office, the Tigerton Library and the Tigerton Clinic.







### First Graders Travel Back in Time

This May the first graders in Mrs. Nordwig's class at the Elementary School got a chance to experience life in the "good old days". Students went to visit the Blue Ribbon Schoolhouse owned by Jane Pringitz as part of their social studies unit on the past. The class learned about what a day was like in a one-room schoolhouse as they toured the building and listened to written personal accounts from people who went to one-room schoolhouses years ago. ### **Ecosystems in Balance**

In Mrs. Brady's third grade class, students learned about a variety of ecosystems. Ecosystems are made up of consumers, producers and decomposers that depend on each other to live. Students learned that organisms need to compete and adapt in their environments. They also studied that changes to an ecosystem affect plants and animals that live there. The students were asked to research an ecosystem, then create a diorama (3-D visual), and write a short report containing a description of their ecosystem, living and nonliving organisms that live in the ecosystem, and what they learned while doing their project.





### **Adventures in Dairyland**

The 4<sup>th</sup> graders participated in the Adventures in Dairyland Program April 13-24. The classes were taught by THS FFA members and other high school student volunteers. The students learned about different cattle breeds in WI, how milk gets from the farm to the consumer, nutrition information, and the many uses of milk in various forms. Some of the activities they took part in were making butter, milk and cheese sampling, watching informative videos, and making a food pyramid bracelet. A dairy farm tour also took place at Norrbom Farms in Elderon. The students were also able to enjoy ice cream sundaes and other food products grown in Wisconsin. The

### **HEALTH MATTERS**

### **Children Entering Kindergarten - What You Need to Know**

### Immunizations (Required)

- 5 doses DTP (diphtheria, tetanus & pertussis)
- 4 doses Polio
- 2 doses MMR (measles, mumps & rubella)
- 3 doses Hepatitis B
- 2 doses Varicella (chickenpox)

You can obtain these immunizations at your physician's clinic or tribal clinic. The Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Dept also holds immunization clinic days for children on Badgercare, who do not have insurance, or whose insurance does not cover vaccines. Call (715)526-4808 for an appointment.

### Well-Child Exam (Recommended but not required)

It is recommended that your child have regular well-child exams, and especially at this time. There is no school form that must be completed for this.

### Eye Exam (Recommended but not required)

Children's vision problems can be treated better if found early, and vision plays an important part in learning. Therefore, Wisconsin schools request that each student entering Kindergarten have a professional eye exam. An optometrist, nurse practitioner, or physician can do this eye exam (could be done as part of the well-child exam.)

When you go for your child's eye exam please take along the attached **Kindergarten Eye Health Exam Report** and ask the staff to complete it. Return it to school. If you need financial assistance to obtain an exam, the Wisconsin Optometric Association program "Vision USA" can help qualifying families (1-877-435-2020.)

### Hearing Screening (Recommended but not required)

Hearing screening is routinely done at school during the fall of preK year, and at some other programs such as HeadStart. If your child has not had hearing testing done at one of these programs, please request one. This could be done at your clinic (as part of the well-child exam) or from the school nurse (see phone number below.)

### Dental Exam (Recommended but not required)

Many dentists recommend that children have their first checkup by this time. There is no school form that must be completed for this.

### Keep school staff informed about important health issues!

Please keep us up to date about specific health concerns that your child may have! Teachers need to know about conditions such as asthma, allergies, insect sting allergies, diabetes, or others affecting your child. You may call school, or the school nurse Kris Labby at the Shawano-Menominee Co Health Dept at 715-526-4808.





A Hunter Safety Course is being offered by the Morris Sportsman Club at the Morris Town Hall, W15320 Berg Rd, Tigerton.

The Class dates and times are:

Friday, June 12th 6:00-9:00pm, Saturday, June 13th 8:30am-4:30pm Sunday, June 14th 9:00am-12:00pm.



Students that are interested in attending the course are required to obtain a Wisconsin DNR Customer ID Number and provide that customer ID number and other personal information to the course instructor at the time of registration. You can obtain a DNR Customer ID Number by calling the DNR Info between 7 am—10 pm at 1-888-936-7463.

Pre-registration is required by contacting Dan Rogowski at 715-535-2631. Seats are limited and will be assigned on a first come, first serve basis.

There is no minimum age limit to attend a Hunter Safety Course in Wisconsin. However the parent or guardian of the student should be cognizant of course content, materials and objectives. Parents and guardians are welcome to attend the course with their student.

The Course Fee is \$10 per Student.

Persons born on or after 1/1/73 must have a hunter education certificate to purchase any Wisconsin hunting license. Unless they are at least 10 years old and wish to participate in the Mentor licensed hunting provision. Persons successfully completing a Hunter Safety Course will receive a basic hunter education graduate certificate and a program patch. Young students certified will be able to purchase a hunting license in any state, and hunt alone (with parental permission) when they turn 14.


